Congratulations to our Class of 2023 - A Fantastic Conclusion to their time at BHS!

Dear BHS Community Members

We extend our sincere congratulations to the 366 students who made up our Class of 2023. They were a fantastic cohort who were strongly connected to their peers and the school throughout their six years at Balwyn High School. They personified our school theme 'Empathy, Belonging, Connections' and were superbly led throughout by Charlie Banias, Margaret Obolenski, Zac Miritis, Tania Batova, Fearghas Bennett and Emma Ho, and a fantastic wider student leadership team.

We are indebted to the ongoing support, care and advocacy of their families, our Leadership, Senior School and Wellbeing Teams and our amazing staff. I thank every contributor who played their part in the success of this cohort, and trust that they too will share in the success of the Class of 2023.

Their excellent results, released on Monday 11 December, are as follows:

2023 School Dux - Douglas Joshi 99.9

Douglas, who was one of our Music Captains this year, participated in both the International and Asian Physics Olympiads, and is one of 25 students Australia wide to be granted an ANU Tuckwell Scholarship for 2024. In achieving this phenomenal score Douglas achieved perfect study scores of 50 in 2022 Mathematical Methods and Physics and this year for Chemistry.

"Across both physics and biology, I've thoroughly appreciated the unparalleled opportunity to not only deepen my knowledge, but also meet like-minded peers from across Australia" (Douglas on his experience with the International Olympiad)

Douglas' dream job would involve scientific research, specifically to use physics to address long standing biological problems and potential for

medical applications. Outside of scientific pursuits, he's a keen cellist, reads a diversity of Literature and philosophy, and is a regular distance runner.

Congratulations Douglas! We can't wait to see what the future holds for you.

The major highlights of the results include:

- 15 students achieved an ATAR of 99 and above
- 53 students (14%) will take their place on the Honour Roll, having achieved an ATAR of 97 and above
- 83 students (23%) achieved an ATAR of 95 and above
- 126 (34%) achieved an ATAR of 90 and above, placing them in the top 10% of the state
- Scores above 40 16.4%, Scores above 40 for Year 11 students 43.4%
- Study Score Median 32, Year 11 Study Score Median of 38



An acknowledgement of Deborah's leadership

ACEL (Australian Council for Educational Leaders) explains that this award acknowledges and perpetuates the memory of the life and work of Debbie Locco ACEL (Vic). Debbie was an inspirational and influential educator who played a pivotal leadership role in empowering and shaping future leaders. The recipient of this award is an ACEL member who has demonstrated Debbie's passion, energy and commitment, to



inspire current and future leaders and members of the profession, to engender the best possible educational outcomes for children and young people. We're so proud of this acknowledgement of Deborah who has committed so much of herself to Balwyn High School over the years and is so committed to state education in Victoria. Her dedication to building leadership capacity at our school is what has enabled the achievement of such great results in so many areas across the school.

Reflecting and resetting in Learning Areas

As we come to the end of another significant year of success in all areas, including academically, the Principal Team is incredibly proud of the members of the Learning and Teaching Committee, especially for their support of our over 50 new teachers in 2023. At this time of year, Heads of Learning spend time reflecting with their teaching teams on what has gone well and where the areas for improvement are for 2024. Success in VCE is not the result of Year 12 teachers working hard – rather it is the result of teachers across the Years 7 – 12 spectrum working hard in teams to identify relevant curriculum areas of need at the appropriate time and supporting each other to meet those needs in their classes. Strong essay writing skills, for example, begin with relevant curriculum related skills being developed from Year 7. As teachers finish formal classes for the year and find out the subjects they will be teaching next year, there is a purposeful team planning being led across the school so that we can continue to meet (and maybe exceed) our strategic plan goals for 2024.

Wednesday 31 January - Students Return to School

Students will return to school on Wednesday 31 January to begin their formal classes. During mid-January, timetables will be made available for families to support their planning. It is important that all students arrive at school on the first day wearing the correct school uniform and the assistance of parents/carers is vital in ensuring these expectations are met. 


Term 4 – Celebration and Community in the Middle School

It is always with a great sense of joy and pride that we reflect on the successes of the Middle School program in final few weeks of Term 4. As 2023 - the year of Empathy, Belonging and Connections - draws to a close, our three year-level themes of Our New Learning Community (Year 7), Making a Difference (Year 8) and My Middle School Experience: Past, Present and Future have each made a significant contribution to the mood of celebration which characterises our school community in Term 4.

Our Year 7 students have been hard at work for months refining and perfecting the wonderful Presentation Night Finale which concluded an uplifting night of acknowledgment and celebration. The Middle School Team was delighted to share in the achievements of Year 7, Year 8 and Year 9 students through the Presentation Night Awards ceremony and we congratulate each and every student who was recognised for their individual successes and contributions. Our Year 7 students took centre stage at Hamer Hall, performing magnificently as part of the Year 7 Choir. It was thrilling

to be able to share such a wonderful evening with an audience of parents, carers and other members of our school community.

This year, the highs of Presentation Night were followed later in Week 10 with the inaugural Year 8 Make a Difference Day. In Year 8, as part of the theme of Making a Difference, students have been focusing on building strong communities and considering the impact that they can make on the lives of others. The program culminated in last Thursday's event: a carnival for local Merrell Kinder and Balwyn North Primary School children, planned and delivered by our Year 8 cohort. Year 8 Tutorial classes had been working hard with their Tutorial teachers to conceptualise and to create a range of entertaining stalls offering games, competitions, crafts and challenges. With the SRC production-line handing out syrupy pancakes and Radio Club taking responsibility for the morning's playlist, the very first iteration of Make a Difference Day was a huge success.

Students heard from their outgoing Year-Level Captains, were introduced to their incoming Year-Level Captains and Student Leaders, were congratulated by the Assistant Principal for Middle School, Director of Middle School and their SLWM and watched the 2023 Balwyn High School Annual Highlights video and were treated to the 2023 Staff Lip Sync video.


STEAM Club update: RACI Crystal Growing Competition 2023


They practiced constructing their own tessellations using physical tools, as well as utilising a variety of digital tools. Some examples of student creations are below.

Why Is It More Difficult To Get Into Some Universities?





As our Year 12 students have just received their ATARs, many students and parents ask questions about which university will deliver a better future for graduates. We all have examples where information about a certain book, film, place or person has been exaggerated, inaccurate or overrated. Sometimes we are pleasantly surprised at how great something is after hearing negative feedback or rumours that were clearly incorrect. The same applies to universities. Never simply believe anything you hear, negative or positive, until you check the validity yourself. And this is why some universities are more difficult to access – inaccurate and sometimes exaggerated perceptions of these universities have been accepted as true.

Students and parents should always visit institutions. I also have feedback from hundreds of exstudents who have studied across all universities.

In essence, some universities are more difficult to gain entry to because of public perception. However, it is very interesting to see that our well-informed students are taking the time to verify what they hear and are choosing courses at all universities across Victoria and Australia.

What courses are becoming more popular?

Courses that are becoming more popular are definitely those which have an inbuilt Industry Placement or work experience. All universities are addressing this and are working very hard to include practical experiences into their courses to attract future students. Swinburne University has been offering extensive work experience in most courses for many years and now offers courses tagged as 'Professional'.

Swinburne courses tagged as 'Professional' are offered in Arts, Engineering, Accounting and Business Information Technology, Business, Business Information Technology, Health Science, Computer Science and Media and Communication. These courses offer a compulsory year of full-time paid employment in some of the most prestigious companies Australia-wide. Students are trained in interview technique and supported as they apply for one, two or more places. They attend formal interviews and must choose the most attractive job offered. As high as 85% of students who complete this year of paid employment are then offered ongoing full-time employment after they complete their last year of study. The year of work is completed in the third year. Students have a guaranteed job waiting for them as they complete their tertiary studies. More information can be gained from course entries on the vtac website.

Because these professional courses are so attractive, students with ATARs as high as 99.95 are choosing to study at Swinburne. Other universities also have wonderful INDUSTRY PLACEMENTS averaging at one or two months duration.

Finally..

Well-informed students are not blindly entering courses at any university. They are completing careful research, seeking credible advice and visiting universities in person to see for themselves and speak to current students and tertiary staff. Thankfully, the days where any university is accepted as being 'the best' no longer exist for well-informed students and parents.

Big Summer Read – a statewide reading program

This is a competition running for students through Victorian public libraries (like Boroondara Library Services) to encourage them to read over the summer. Students register and record the books they have read or listened to between 1 December and 31 January and can win prizes as a reward. Consider a trip to the <u>State Library of Victoria</u> in the city during the summer. You see the World of the Book exhibition or Mirror: new views on photography (both free!). It is also projected with Christmas lights at night.

Boroondara libraries are open over the summer to borrow print books and a range of other resources. Boroondara photo competition opens for entries early next year – start snapping great pics over the summer. The theme is Explore Boroondara.

Students interested in writing should consider a competition that runs each term and is free to enter called <u>Little Stories</u>, <u>Big Ideas</u>. The theme for Term 4 is Magic and entries are due December 22. Watch out for new themes each term of 2024. It is free to enter and there are great prizes on offer.
